COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT

Provides annual federal grants on a formula basis to states, cities, and counties to develop viable urban communities by providing decent housing and a suitable living environment, and by expanding economic opportunities, principally for low- and moderate-income persons.



- Eligible CDBG activities include:
 - Housing Rehabilitation
 - Housing Counseling
 - Public Facilities
 - Public Services/ Human Services
 - Neighborhood Revitalization
 - Economic Development



HOME INVESTMENTS PARTNERSHIP PROGRAM

Provides federal grant funding through formula allocations to states and local governments to strengthen public-private partnerships and increase the supply of affordable housing for low- and very low-income households.

- ➤ Eligible HOME activities include:
 - Homeownership Assistance
 - Housing Rehabilitation
 - New Construction of Affordable Housing






EMERGENCY SOLUTIONS GRANT PROGRAM

Provides federal grant funds through a formula process to territories, states, metropolitan cities, and urban counties for five main program components to address homelessness making it rare, brief, and non-recurring.

- Eligible ESG activities include:
 - Street Outreach
 - Shelter Operations
 - Assistance for At-Risk Homeless





STATE HOUSING INITIATIVES PARTNERSHIP PROGRAM

Provides state Sadowski trust funds to local governments in Florida as an incentive to create partnerships that produce and preserve affordable homeownership and multifamily housing to serve very low, low, and moderate income families.

- Eligible SHIP activities include
 - Homeownership Assistance
 - Housing Repair,
 Rehabilitation,
 Resiliency, Accessibility,
 and Reconstruction
 - New Construction of Affordable Housing
 - Housing Counseling
