



## Southside Infrastructure Enhancements

Progress is constantly happening in Tallahassee. On the Southside, a variety of projects are helping reduce localized flooding, increase mobility and create more recreational opportunities.

Recently, the newest phase of FAMU Way between Pinellas Street and Gamble Street officially opened to traffic. Traffic can now flow between Wahnish Way and Gamble Street without needing to cut through nearby neighborhoods. This connection also provides motorists traveling between Gamble Street and downtown an alternative to Gaines Street as an east-west connector.

In addition to the roadway extension, this phase of the project created a new multi-use stormwater facility, called Tallahassee Junction. Designed as a neighborhood amenity, Tallahassee Junction offers a quarter-mile walking trail, sheltered picnic areas, a bike repair station and more.

Another exciting feature completed with this phase of the FAMU Way project is Blueprint's continuation of the Capital Cascades Trail. This section was the final piece needed to fully connect to the St. Marks Trail, which means residents can now walk and bike from Cascades Park to the coast, and anywhere in between, without ever needing to get in a lane with car traffic.

Beyond FAMU Way, another multi-year project is currently underway to enhance a vital portion of the stormwater drainage network near Kissimmee Street. This major drainage channel collects stormwater from FAMU, FSU, downtown, Frenchtown and even Midtown. A key feature of the project is the use of gabion baskets, which create an environmentally friendly

retaining wall system. These retaining walls will improve public safety by stabilizing failing side slopes, reducing further erosion and eliminating threats downstream to Lake Munson. Phase one of the project is expected to be completed in spring 2019.

A variety of smaller projects are also helping enhance the quality of life on the Southside. For example, Capital Park was recently refurbished thanks to a grant from Scotts Lawn and Major League Baseball. Crews have been working to install sidewalks on Putnam Street and Palmetto Street. The Southside Farmers Market is making it easy to access fresh food, and water utility improvements are happening on Katherine Speed Court.

The City of Tallahassee is committed to investing in infrastructure to ensure that it can continue providing safe, reliable, quality services for all residents.

## Look. Listen. Learn.

Fire can happen anywhere to anyone, which is why it's vital to remember the basics of fire safety.

- **LOOK** – Where could a fire start in your home? Identify potential hazards and take steps to remedy them.
- **LISTEN** – Smoke alarms save lives. Test yours regularly. Smoke alarms should be placed near every room where someone sleeps, and there should be at least one on each floor of your home.
- **LEARN** – Know two ways out of every room. Make sure all doors and windows leading outside open easily and are free of clutter.

## Turn Around. Don't Drown.

Water is a powerful force. During thunderstorms, localized flooding can cause road closures. If you encounter a blocked or flooded roadway, turn around. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reports that more than half of all flood-related drownings occur when a vehicle is driven into hazardous flood water. Many of these deaths are preventable. One foot of rushing water can carry away a small car, while 2 feet of rushing water can carry away most vehicles. In addition to being swept up in the current, flood water could contain debris, contamination and other harmful elements. Stay safe. Turn around. Don't drown.

## Prepare for Winter Heating

Fall is a good time for servicing or upgrading home heating systems. If you're replacing older heating equipment, City of Tallahassee loans and rebates are available for qualifying energy-efficient water heaters, heat pumps and gas furnaces.
